

Dragon Boat

Walking along the esplanade in Redcliffe, I suddenly feel great. Is this the endorphins kicking in? I don't know, but I feel like I could walk for miles. I stretch out, striding as long and as quickly as I can. If I was at home, I might break into a jog, as I've been wont to do in the last month or so. The daily

morning walk that I started seriously around Christmas time is bearing fruit: I am leaner and fitter, and every now and then I get to feel like this. In the solitude of the creek walk in Romsey I'm not ashamed to break into a run for a couple of hundred metres or so, but here all I'm prepared to do is keep walking, as fast as I can. But it is a good feeling, this striding out, this feeling that I can go on like this all day. I turn back after a while, reluctant, but knowing that this feeling won't last, and I'll be sorry if I have to stagger back after overdoing it.

As I stride out in the sunshine, and the world slips past so smoothly, I'm reminded of last week, and my first time in a dragon boat. The conference centre I'd stayed at was on a little lagoon, and the local dragon boat club provided an opportunity to go out with one of their instructors on a boat. I had been told that peak fitness wasn't necessary, so I'd lined up with the others, about 16 of us in each boat. I was a little worried about the niggling pain in my back, caused just a few nights earlier when I'd tried to lift something I shouldn't have. I wondered whether paddling might make things worse, possibly causing us to have to go back to drop me off, but I hoped it would be ok.

We were schooled in the ways of the dragon boat by our trainer Janice, told how to get in carefully, how to stop the boat (vital information!), how to hold it steady on the water if Janice needed to stand and speak. Paddling a dragon boat, it turns out, is different to rowing. You raise the paddle at 90 degrees to the water, plunge it straight down and pull it back to about level with your hip, then raise it again, all the while keeping it roughly vertical. Your body does the work; bending forward from your waist until your head is almost parallel with the water, then sitting up to pull back through the water with the paddle. "Keep your A-frame" Janice told us, the shape made between your paddle, your arms and your head. With paddling, we were told, timing is everything. When we all worked together, paddling as one, the boat would lift out of the water a little, enabling us to move more quickly. It was a good idea to have two people who had a good sense of rhythm - musicians or dancers - at the front for the others to follow. Only one musician stepped up, so I had to confess that I was once a marching girl, and I was called to take my place at the front of the boat. "UP! DOWN! PULL THROUGH!" called Janice, while Amelia and I at the front of the boat tried to lead, watching to keep time with each other as we paddled on.

From my position, it wasn't possible to see how well we were doing at keeping in time with each other, but Janice assured us we were looking good. We glanced a across at the other boat from time, and wondered if we were doing better than them. They seemed to be all flailing arms.

and paddles. Janice assured us we looked much better, and took us through some routines for starting a race and then the long strokes needed to get the boat moving as quickly as possible. Bending at the waist, stretching to push through as much water as possible, we splattered across the lagoon. Sometimes my paddle hit the water with a smack instead of a nice smooth drop, sometimes I lost my grip on it and missed a couple of beats. That didn't matter too much, because we were carried forward by the momentum of others who were paddling well at that moment. Every now and then, from my position at the front of the boat, I could feel that we had all clicked. In these moments, the prow lifted slightly, and we skimmed along quickly and smoothly. It felt effortless, as if we could do this all day.

We stepped out of the boat at the end, victorious 2-1 over our sworn enemies in the other boat, who had discovered some huge water pistols and fired some salvos before we could find our own weapons. Better late than never, we gave them the soaking they deserved at the end of the races, and we all wandered back to the conference centre in the warm glow of a new venture attempted, new skills learned, the camaraderie of the morning's events. I bent over to pick up my shoes, and suddenly realised that my back felt completely better. The niggling injury, which had needed ibuprofen each morning to settle it, had completely gone. "Who knew?" said my physio daughter drily when I told her later on the phone "Apparently movement helps things get better."

Striding along the esplanade now, I remember the lifting, the skimming, the effortlessness, the elation of the boat ride. The way my faults and missteps didn't matter so much, because I was carried by others in those moments. The way that being aware of each other and working together made it felt so right and so good. The way that I had worried that my incapacity and my lack of ability might slow us down, when instead I had found that I had long-buried gifts that were vital to the team. The way my own healing came: through stretching...and movement...and losing and finding myself in the rhythm and the community of the boat.

Sammy Stamp

The UCAF Stamp Fund has a long history of fund-raising by collecting, trimming, and selling used postage stamps. So far, up to 3rd May this year, sales reached about \$12,975 (same time last year, \$11,096). Total grants approved so far this year - \$19,000

Note - Romsey and Gisborne Congregations have collection boxes for used postage stamps. No need to trim or remove stamps from paper, just tear or cut the corner off the envelope, with the stamp attached, well away (2cm) from the stamp so it is not damaged. Half envelopes are acceptable. Old stamps, new stamps, foreign stamps, on paper or off, and whole stamp collections are all valuable for Sammy Stamp. Encourage family and friends to save their stamps and pass them on to Romsey or Gisborne members once or twice a year.

Most of the stamps that Sammy Stamp sell are 'on paper' and are sold 'by the kilo'. Rare stamps are sold individually.

CoCo Report

for meeting held Saturday 2nd June 2018 at Sutton Grange

Colin Chapman welcomed us, and also Rose Broadstock and Iris Blythe from Presbytery: they had come to Coco to talk about a three-year Partnership review and also a review for Wendy Elson's 3rd year as an exit placement.

They first spent some time with us sorting out the Worship Plan for June as we considered, with two of our ministers taking Compassionate Leave, how to ensure that a minister was available to lead the services with Holy Communion. Thank you to all those churches who combined with others, at such short notice, to make our task a little easier.

Rose and Iris then discussed with us the process for the reviews, and it has been decided that Wendy's 3-year review will be undertaken with Presbytery and Coco. The Partnership 3-year review will be commenced with a Presbytery representative meeting with each of the congregations to consider a number of questions relating to how the Partnership is working for each congregation, and to suggest what could be done to achieve more "fresh expressions" in the future. The questions will be circulated to the congregations before each meeting to give some time for consideration by the congregation members. This process will be completed at each of the Churches in time for a report to be considered by Coco at their September meeting, and presented to everyone at the 5th Sunday Combined Service in September.

We didn't have a Ministers' report this month due to the unexpected Compassionate Leave of two of our Ministers, and also the fact that Annette was on planned Annual Leave at this time.

We then heard the report from the Woodend Uniting Church Working Group which has spent some time considering the Engineers Report, tradesmen's quotes, and possible visions for the Woodend buildings. Two tentative visions have

emerged -

- a. An upgraded current pattern of use of the building complex:
 - the Church be retained as a worship centre for services and other spiritual activities
 - the hall be retained as a large space with a stage and meeting room suitable for meetings, exhibitions, theatre productions, etc and probably also providing space for sorting and storing Op shop goods.
- b. An integrated community mission outreach hub:
 - the Church be a multi-functional place for worship, other spiritual activities and other meetings
- the hall be converted into a community mission outreach centre comprising the Op Shop, including the sales, staff, sorting and storage spaces, a Food Bank, a social enterprise cafe and "hot desk" office space.

Both these visions were discussed at length, particularly in the light of the expiry of the current Op Shop lease at the end of October, and the consequent decisions that need to be made about the operation of the Op Shop. Further meetings with everyone involved, will be held in the near future, hopefully leading towards a decision being made.

Planning for the Church Camp to be held at DOXA Malmsbury, are continuing, and everyone is asked to have their potential attendances sent to Bronwyn Hewitt by 28th June. People will be welcome for day sessions as well as those intending to stay overnight.

Due to time constraints, we only had brief Congregation reports, and people are urged to read about upcoming events in Partnership in Print.

We concluded the meeting with the Benediction and our next meeting will be held on 4th August at Kyneton.

Gisborne Chaplaincy Report 2018

Greetings

As I enter my 26th year in Chaplaincy, fourteen here at GSC, I ponder what has been achieved and what has changed over the years. When I started, there were around 45 Chaplains, mostly full time and all in secondary College and many were ordained ministers.

Now there are over 250 Chaplains, mostly lay people in part time employment, mainly in Primary schools. I think there are about 75 in Secondary Colleges, mostly fulltime.

The National Chaplaincy Support Program allowed for the engagement of many more chaplains and this has changed the face of Chaplaincy. Older Chaplaincy's have a support group which meet regularly to support the Chaplain and to fundraise a quota to keep a Chaplain in their school. I am fortunate to have a remarkable group of people who support Chaplaincy here at GSC, with many not having any students at the school.

The Macedon Ranges Community are very generous to the students here at GSC. This allows students to participate in the school community without discrimination due to their financial or family situation.

I continue to meet families where there is a life threatening/changing illness; sometimes over coffee away from the home stresses, sometimes at school. The conversations are precious and an insight into their daily routine, which can be very painful to watch.

In the past year, the school community lost through sudden death three former students, which had far-reaching consequences both within the school and within the wider community. The grief around these deaths was heartbreaking. The support of the Wellbeing team has been tireless. We are fortunate to be led by an amazing woman, Belinda O'Meara whose knowledge and abilities are to be admired.

She leads a team consisting of a Social Worker/ Art Therapist, Youth Worker, Chaplain, Integration & Careers Teacher who meet regularly to consider the best ways to support our youth and families. We also have the services of an external Psychologist and Counsellor who come weekly to see students referred to them.

We are fortunate to have Jon Morley as the new Principal; Jon has been at the school for many years and is excited about the future of Gisborne Secondary College.

To my committee whom I cannot thank enough for their work in support of Chaplaincy here, my gratitude. To all the donors, financial and of goods, thank you. May you continue to see and hear about the gift/s you give our students and families through your generosity.
